


3b AIRCASTLE. 4. Bred from Greenisland by Chinese White. A flower of intriguing colour, the crown being a lemon, apricot shade with a slightly darker rim. The petals open milk white but soon become an unusual greenish beige. Raised by Mr. Grant Mitsch of America, a bloom of Aircastle was judged the best flower in London at the Daffodil show on 18th April, 1963.

2c ARCTIC DORIC. 2 (Guy L. Wilson). Almost a blue white with a firm flat perianth and rather slender crown. A strong grower.

2c AVE. 3 (Guy L. Wilson). An almost perfect pure white, smooth and symmetrical, having a broad pointed flat perianth standing at right angles to the large crown. A splendid show flower.

2a BALLINTOY. 4-5 (W. J. Dunlop). A nicely proportioned late flower with a golden yellow perianth and rich deep red crown. Of value for late shows.

2c BALLOO. 3 (Guy L. Wilson). An enormous flower of great substance with large spade shaped perianth, segments of sparkling white and large widely expanded crown of pure white growing on a very strong stalk from a plant with wide broad leaves.

3b BALLYCASTLE. 3-4 (W. J. Dunlop). A charming flower with a broad white perianth and shallow white crown lit by a dainty pinkish orange rim.

2b BELEEK. 5 (Guy L. Wilson). Bred from Rose of Tralee by Evening a very late flower of beautiful form and having both quality and substance. The perianth is pure white, the crown is slightly bell shaped and of a lovely pale clear rose, in some seasons unfortunately the crown may be almost white. A short necked sturdy plant.

A curious most distinct and attractive variety with flowers of excellent form, balance and fine substance having broad, flat petals and a well proportioned crown. When it opens the whole flower is clear greeny sulphur-lemon, but the crown gradually fades to almost pure white.

3b **BRAVURA.** 5 (Guy L. Wilson). A very large flower with a broad very white perianth and a well balanced vivid orange scarlet crown. A strong and vigorous plant.

lc BROUGHSHANE. 3 (Guy L. Wilson). A.M. at R.H.S. 1943, and at Wisley trials 1956. A glorious giant white trumpet of perfect form and balance, bred from Trostan by Kanchenjunga. The noble trumpet being widely flanged, reflexed and frilled, does not over-balance the immense perianth, which is fully  $5\frac{1}{2}$  inches across, the outer segments being up to  $2\frac{1}{4}$  inches wide. The flower which is of great substance and quite exceptionally durable, is carried on a stem well over two feet high, while the foliage measures as much as  $1\frac{1}{2}$  inches in breadth.

2b BUNCRANA. 3-4 (J. L. Richardson). A.M. at R.H.S. 1942. A most distinct flower with pure white shovel shaped segments, the cup is longish and frilled and of deep peachy orange colour.

3c CHINESE WHITE. 3-4 (Guy L. Wilson). F.C.C. at R.H.S. 1949. For over ten years this has been the best exhibition IIIc. Its rounded, satin smooth petals and shallow, fluted crown make it a superb show flower; a flower no exhibitor should be without.

Daffodil Year-book from 1946 onwards as the best exhibition Illa, and has already won many championships at overseas shows. A truly gorgeous, large, tall stemmed flower of fine quality, having a very broad, rich clear golden perianth and perfectly proportioned, shallow deep red crown. A plant of great vigour and rapid increase.

2c COTTERTON. 3 (Brodie of Brodie). Bred from Tain by Evening, this flower is proving to be a most valuable parent for breeding top quality ice-white flowers. Knowehead and Rashee, both exquisite flowers, are two of its children. The smooth, slightly pointed perianth stands at right angles to the almost trumpet length crown, and the whole flower is purest ice-white. A sturdy but rather short stem.

2c COURAGE. 3 (Brodie of Brodie). An immense waterlily-like flower of splendid substance and quality, and purest white throughout: great broad pointed perianth, and large crown, slightly flanged at the mouth. A glorious white flower, very vigorous and free flowering, and a valuable parent.

2a CRAIGYWARREN. 3-4 (W. J. Dunlop). A fine large flower with an attractive waxy texture. The deep yellow perianth is smooth and flat; the crown is crimson red and well proportioned. A fine show flower and a good doer.

Ia CROMARTY. 3-4 (Brodie of Brodie). A.M. at R.H.S. 1938. A sturdy, free-flowered garden plant and a perfect show flower.

As it holds its colour well and is very vigorous it makes a fine garden plant.

A magnificent flower having a broad smooth, circular perianth of fine substance, and a shallow expanded, vivid orange-scarlet crown: immensely vigorous, blooms and increases freely, and is very good in the cool greenhouse.

The perianth is well proportioned and of great substance; the crown is bowl shaped and frilled bright orange red shading to gold at the base. A very vigorous plant.

Ib FORESIGHT. I (Guy L. Wilson). A.M. at R.H.S. 1945. One of the first daffodils to open its flowers, its neat pale golden trumpet stands out well from a lovely broad flat white perianth, and steals the glory from early Crocuses. It is a vigorous grower, is free flowering, and forces well for February.

2a FORTHRIGHT. 4 (Brodie of Brodie). A.M., R.H.S., 1954. Magnificent large, bold and striking flower of grand form and carriage. Very broad flat rich golden perianth of immense substance and perfectly balanced large bold orange-gold crown, neatly flanged at brim; tall very strong short necked stem.

2b FOYLE. 3-4 (Guy L. Wilson). Very large flower of beautiful smooth texture and quality. Large pointed broad flat pure white perianth up to 5 inches in diameter: the large crown is faint creamy primrose, flushed and suffused with faint rose-pink.

3c FRIGID. 6 (Guy L. Wilson). F.C.C., R.H.S., 1950. A.M., Haarlem, 1949. Probably the whitest thing yet raised; the most wonderfully lovely end-of-the-season flower blooming along with the last of the poets: perianth up to 4 inches in diameter, composed of beatuiful pointed broad segments, smallish, fluted, almost flat crown. The flower is of purest ice-white throughout both perianth and crown, except for a most lovely vivid emerald eye; quite the coldest looking flower I have seen: good stem and neck. A vase of this placed between two vases of late scarlet eyed poets makes a picture of startling and ethereal beauty.

2c FROZEN. 3-4 (Guy L. Wilson). Bred from a seedling by Greenland, this is a first class pure white flower; short necked, and well posed on a strong stem. Broad pointed smooth perianth and perfectly proportioned crown of great substance and quality.

Id GARRON. 3-4 (Guy L. Wilson). A.M. at R.H.S. 1944 and at Wisley trials 1946. A wonderfully vigorous and impressive garden plant. The soft lemon flower is enormous and yet full of quality. The perianth has broad, slightly waved, long-pointed segments of smooth velvety texture and much substance, and the trumpet is nicely serrated.

The perianth is white, and the huge ace of spade shaped segments form an almost perfect circle; the trumpet, which passes from palest lemon to white, is widely flanged and serrated.

Tall and vigorous grower.

The bell-mouthed trumpet is perfectly balanced, and the broad, flat perianth is velvet smooth. For a long time it has been considered the best yellow trumpet for exhibition.
